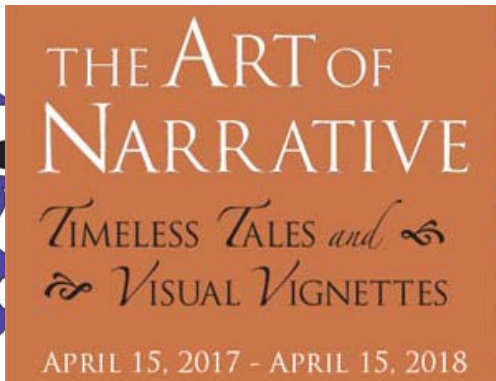
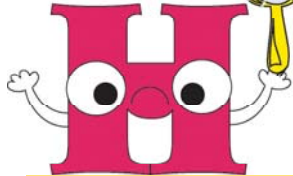

## WHAT IS NARRATIVE ART?

**Narrative art** is a work of art that tells a **story**. Find the work of art shown below in the gallery.

This painting is an illustration for an *Aesop's Fable* called *The Vain Jackdaw*. The bird known as the Jackdaw wanted to win a beauty contest, although he did not feel very pretty. He decided to steal feathers from the more colorful birds and place them on his head. The Jackdaw won the contest, but the other birds were angry that he had cheated. The other birds flew at the Jackdaw and plucked their stolen feathers from the Jackdaw's head.

### Discussion Questions:

- Which bird do you think is the Jackdaw?
- What appears to be happening in this work of art?
- What is the **moral**, or lesson, of the story?
